Meeting Minutes
April 5, 2006

Approximately 1:34 pm; Chairman Winn called the meeting to Order

- 1) Introductions of Members and Attendees – Quorum Established. Chairman Winn reminds agencies to submit any WRAC membership updates to County staff for Board of Supervisor approval and suggests preparing a resolution establishing interim voting rights for new members; Member Greening asks about the renewal process for the Board of Supervisors-appointed Agriculture-at-Large and Environment-at-Large memberships.
- 2) Approval of March 2006 Meeting Minutes – The Assembly Bill number referenced in Item #3, Public Comment, is 1839 not 1836. The grammar of the motion under Item #5, Presentation on the RPD Ordinance, was requested to be modified for the letter to the Board of Supervisors to something similar to the following:
“Because of the impacts to water resources and the huge problem in the County with legal underlying lots, the WRAC recommends stopping the RPD process and quickly convening a task force made up of people with varying expertise, including expertise in water resources, to study underlying problems.” Upon motion of Member Mullholand, second by Member Greening, and vocal vote, minutes of the March 1, 2006 meeting of the Water Resource Advisory Committee (WRAC) were approved as amended. Chairman Winn requests members to verify attendance sheet.
- 3) Public Comment – Member Snyder speaks to Santa Maria Groundwater Basin litigation and key decisions; Discussion regarding carpooling to Groundwater Banking meeting and attendance; Member Sinton speaks to Notice of Preparation EIR on San Miguel development project and discussion ensues on water resources impacts and Ag Policy #11; Member Bianchi speaks to climate change article in March Science Magazine.
- 4) a. San Luis Drainage Update – Member Bianchi speaks to March/April Western Water article on Selenium; Member Winholtz speaks to invitation to meet with Supervisor Bianchi regarding the Board of Supervisors opinion on the EIS; Member Greening speaks to July alternative selection date; discussion ensues regarding County Counsel’s readiness to act if ocean drainage alternative is selected, Coastal Commission appeal.

b. Paso Groundwater Banking Group – Courtney Howard, SLO County Public Works, summarizes the agenda for April 12th meeting (tour of Polonio Pass

WTP, banking methods presentation and panel discussion). Member Greening comments on legal questions that will need to be answered.

c. IRWM – Paavo Ogren, SLO County Public Works Deputy Director speaks to results of Implementation Proposal evaluation, impact of State priorities on selection of proposals for call-back, approach to next round of Implementation Proposal submittals. Discussion ensues on using other successful plans for guidance, mid-2007 timeline for second-round submittals, effect on time delays on grant money available, ability of State agencies to maintain discretion in judging the proposals.

d. Other – Mobile Lab Availability: Although the County Flood Control General budget currently shows an available balance for Mobile Lab use, Member Tom Mora from the Upper Salinas RCD states his understanding that the budget has been exhausted and that the RCD hopes that the Board of Supervisors will authorize discretionary funding to allow the people on the waiting list to utilize the Mobile Lab. Rainfall and Reservoir Update: A table was provided showing current rainfall totals and reservoir levels. State Infrastructure Bonds: Since they will not be on the June ballot, an agenda item to review them will be deferred until a future meeting.

- 5) Presentation on Assembly Bill 2717 – Landscape Task Force – Ron Munds, Utilities Conservation Coordinator for San Luis Obispo City, presents results from multi-disciplinary task force tasked with developing recommendations for implementing conservation measures related to landscape design and management. Discussion of balance between aesthetics, costs and conservation; water savings estimate of 600,000 to 1 million acre-feet for \$250-500/AF, for an equivalent of serving 2 million homes.
- 6) Review of “Recommendations” from current Master Water Plan – Courtney Howard, SLO County Public Works Water Resources Engineer, describes how recommendations have either been addressed by completed projects or plan to be addressed via the Data Enhancement and Groundwater Banking Plans; other recommendations are to be addressed via discussion topics with the WRAC during development of the New Master Water Plan.
- 7) Future Agenda Items – Brief discussion.

SUBJECT: Agenda Item 4.d: WRAC Membership and By-Laws Update

Recommendation

It is recommended that the WRAC review and discuss issues associated with the WRAC Membership list to provide input and recommendations so that staff can develop specific recommendations for the June 2006 WRAC meeting.

Discussion

Over the past couple WRAC meetings, some questions have surfaced regarding WRAC appointments and membership attendance. The appointments to WRAC are required to follow the “Maddy Act,” and Public Works staff contacted the County Clerk to determine which vacancies currently exist for WRAC. The following is a table illustrating the current vacancies according to County Clerk official records.

The Nacimiento Advisory Committee was thought deleted but that action will need to be included in the next Board resolution. Advertising of the vacant positions is required under the Maddy Act (Government Code Sections 54970-54975).

Agricultural and Environment at Large members and their alternates are to be replaced or reaffirmed in January of odd number years, according to the WRAC By-Laws adopted July 19, 2005 by the Board of Supervisors. Consequently, rather than advertise immediately for the vacant Environmental at Large Alternate vacancies, advertising for the two members and their alternates should occur during the fall of this year so that appointments are timely for 2007. Since LOCSD indicated that they will provide new nominees in May, the Board resolution can then be prepared for confirmation of all the new 2006 nominees.

In reviewing the current status, we identified the following challenges in timely nominations and approval:

1. Coordination between agency nominations and Board approvals.
2. Compliance with the Maddy Act.
3. Voting rights of nominees prior to Board approval.

Discussion on timing issues should consider establishing an annual date for submittal of nominees in the by-laws. In addition, consideration of modifying the County's advertising of the Agricultural and Environmental members (and Board appointees) may be needed to better match timing of agency nominations. Consideration of Maddy Act (attached) requirements will also be needed. Voting rights of nominees cannot be established until approved by the Board. In cases where the result of a vote on a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors could be affected by a nominee who has not yet been approved by Resolution of the Board of Supervisors, then the WRAC recommendation should include information regarding how the nominee would have voted and how the recommendation would have changed. Since these instances would be infrequent, then procedurally we believe that the nominee should be allowed to vote (albeit informally) and only in cases where that nominee's vote would swing an outcome would clarification to the Board be required.

Article II.7 of the WRAC By-Laws is intended to address the issue of membership absences and reads as follows:

“Three successive unexcused absences of a member without notifying the Committee, if no alternate is representing the member, shall be cause for the member to be dropped from the Committee and the member's agency shall be notified and nomination of a new representative requested.”

While the by-law language is explicit that absences “shall be cause for the member to be dropped” it does not automatically result in termination of membership. Numerous examples in contracts and personnel matters provide guidance that persons who are not meeting standards should be provided notice and opportunity to meet those standards. Thus, we believe that

correspondence to the absent agencies is an appropriate next step; and that WRAC should review their replies while considering recommendations to the Board at your next meeting on whether individual members or their agencies should be dropped.

Other Agency Involvement/Impact

Improving the coordination on nominees and appointments is needed. Terminating individual members or their agencies could be controversial. Nevertheless, the need for attendance is important since many of the issues reviewed at WRAC are often discussed over the course of several meetings prior to the development of formal recommendations to the Board and ongoing attendance is important for those background discussions.

Financial Considerations

County Staff time for processing membership updates is relatively minimal except when multiple updates are required in any given year, which results in redundant administrative efforts and inefficiencies.

Results

Review and discussion of WRAC membership issues so that specific actions can be developed will result in improved administrative efficiencies and WRAC attendance.

“Maddy Act”

WAIS Document Retrieval CALIFORNIA CODES
GOVERNMENT CODE
SECTION 54970-54974

54970. (a) The Legislature finds and declares that a vast and largely untapped reservoir of talent exists among the citizenry of the State of California, and that rich and varied segments of this great human resource are, all too frequently, not aware of the many opportunities which exist to participate in and serve on local regulatory and advisory boards, commissions, and committees.

(b) The Legislature further finds and declares that the general public of this state has traditionally been denied access to information regarding vacancies which occur on such boards, commissions, and committees, thereby denying most citizens and interest groups the opportunity to nominate for consideration by the respective appointive powers persons whose particular strengths, backgrounds, experience, perspective, and talents might contribute significantly to efficient and representative policy development and administration in local government.

(c) The Legislature further finds and declares that the respective local appointive powers have been denied access to a talent resource hitherto untapped.

(d) The Legislature further finds and declares that all citizens of the state, regardless of their place of residence should have equal access to specific and current information about the many local regulating and advisory boards, commissions, and committees and equal opportunity to be informed of vacancies which shall occur thereon, so that they may pursue the opportunity to participate in and contribute to the operations of local government by serving on such boards, commissions, and committees.

(e) It is therefore the intent of the Legislature that this chapter shall apply to all cities and all counties throughout California, including charter cities and charter counties.

54971. As used in this chapter:

(a) "Legislative body" means the board of supervisors or its chairman in the case of the county, or the city council or the mayor in the case of a city.

(b) "Local agency" means a county or city, whether chartered or general law.

“Maddy Act”

54972. On or before December 31 of each year, each legislative body shall prepare an appointments list of all regular and ongoing boards, commissions, and committees which are appointed by the legislative body of the local agency. This list shall be known as the Local Appointments List. The list shall contain the following information:

(a) A list of all appointive terms which will expire during the next calendar year, with the name of the incumbent appointee, the date of appointment, the date the term expires, and the necessary qualifications for the position.

(b) A list of all boards, commissions, and committees whose members serve at the pleasure of the legislative body, and the necessary qualifications for each position.

54973. The Local Appointments List shall be made available to members of the public for a reasonable fee which shall not exceed actual cost. The legislative body shall designate the public library with the largest service population within its jurisdiction to receive a copy of the list.

54974. (a) Whenever an unscheduled vacancy occurs in any board, commission, or committee for which the legislative body has the appointing power, whether due to resignation, death, termination, or other causes, a special vacancy notice shall be posted in the office of the clerk of the local agency, the library designated pursuant to Section 54973, and in other places as directed by the legislative body, not earlier than 20 days before or not later than 20 days after the vacancy occurs. Final appointment to the board, commission, or committee shall not be made by the legislative body for at least 10 working days after the posting of the notice in the clerk's office.

(b) Notwithstanding subdivision (a), the legislative body may, if it finds that an emergency exists, fill the unscheduled vacancy immediately. A person appointed to fill the vacancy shall serve only on an acting basis until the final appointment is made pursuant to this section.

SUBJECT: Agenda Item #5: Proposed 2006/07 Fiscal Year Budget for the San Luis Obispo Flood Control and Water Conservation District.

Recommendation

Review and recommend approval of the proposed FY 2006/07 Budget.

Discussion

Please review the attached proposed budget for next year. Some points worth noting in the budget are as follows:

- The State property tax shift is no longer in effect; the budget reflects total allocations of tax revenues.
- Budgeted expenditures exceed budgeted revenues by \$267,500. Balancing the budget requires the use of 1) approximately \$150,000 of reserves to help fund the \$175,000 match required for the Prop 50 IRWM Planning grants 2) about \$117,500 in savings anticipated from the current year budget.
- Reduction in budgets for “General” and the coordination with some agencies have been reallocated to the IRWM Plan to provide more specific budgeting of efforts and recognizing that interagency coordination is now a specific function of the IRWM Plan.
- Many aspects of efforts to digitize archived, “hard copy” records have been completed and allow a reduction in the data collection and management program.
- Priority for the New Master Water Plan results in an increase budget for that line item.
- New line items have been established to track efforts on the IRWM Planning grant.
